President's Report 2017/18

Firstly, I would like to thank the member of the Board and Club, along with partners and Friends of Rotary for their support and friendship during the year.

This year has been a bit of a rollercoaster with some successes and also a few low times with the loss of long term and very active members. We have welcomed new members Geoff White, Greg Honeychurch and Kim Allmond but have sadly said goodbye to Ted Burford after 50 years of service, Euan Semple, Graham and Rosemary Pulford, who have all moved away from Clare to be closer to family and friends. We also accepted the resignation of Pam Jacobsen.

Whilst I had an agenda to look at changing the Club meetings back to weekly meetings as this was what I felt the desire of the Club was, this has not occurred. We have managed to achieve a couple of other objectives primarily re-introducing fellowship activities on the 5th Monday (which on a couple of occasions turned into Sunday meetings). I believe everyone (host or visitor) has enjoyed the opportunity to re-connect with other members on a social basis. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Jim and Joan, Glenn and Shirly, Bill and Maggie for opening their homes for us all to invade. On other occasions, we visited O'Leary Walker and Watervale Hotel.

Our major fundraisers this year were the Rotary Art Show, Newspaper Collection and Wine sales. The Rotary Art Show was somewhat challenging this year with the change to the registration process which resulted in us receiving entries for every state for the first time. Being a new process, we lost a few entries as they did not feel they were computer literate enough to enter but I am certain this will change next year when some of our local artists see the benefit of using Gallery 24/7. I also feel that we will attract more inter state and intra state entrants next year as we become better known on Gallery 24/7.

Our newspaper collection continued again this year although the tonnage collected has reduced slightly. Local residents are still happy to support this project although on a couple of occasions we have struggled for collectors. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those members and partners who have assisted with this collection. Cold winter mornings are not the most enticing time to be out but you soon warm up throwing bundles of paper around.

We have continued to support other annual projects such as Rotary Youth Driver Awareness (RYDA), Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN), Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA), Nations Science Youth Forum (NSYF) and the Rotary Youth Exchange Program. We have been delighted by the calibre of students we have been able to support this year and this is a real credit to the local schools and teachers.

We have also continued to support our usual community projects and had a wide variety of guest speakers at our meeting during the year.

Rotary continues to change and one of the major changes approaching is the amalgamation of District 9520 and 9500 to become 9510. This will happen during Josie's year and planning is already underway as to how this will work and what effect this will have on various Clubs.

One of the big concerns we have is meeting attendance. Whilst there is no longer a requirement for regular attendance at meetings and projects, you do have to ask yourself what is the benefit of membership – ie what am I getting out of Rotary and what is Rotary getting out of me?

We have been very fortunate to have had a lot of representation in the local media along with social media and need to continue to foster this relationship. By being active in the community and our faces in from to the public, we should be able to attract new members. This said, it is every members responsibility to encourage members of the community to join our ranks. We need younger members who will in turn attract more younger members.

As I hand the reins over to Josie, I am confident this Club will continue to “punch above its weight” and achieve great things in this community.

Annual Report for Community Committee 2017-2018

Our year started with planning for 12 months of paper collecting, taking into consideration daylight saving. We continued to place our thank you notes that also had the collection dates, in the letter boxes. I have received some positive comments about these. A big THANK YOU goes to Rotarian Jim Scott who developed the thank you notes and also organised for a big letter drop, which explained the history and why our club collects these newspapers, free of charge and covered the Care Township. We have noticed that we were picking up papers from houses that previously did not put their papers out for collection. We experienced some delay in transporting the paper to the recycler, and at the time of this report two truckloads have been recycled, 26 tonnes approximately in all. Thanks go to the Heinrich boys for their assistance, and to the Rotarians who collect the papers, a big thumbs up!

Josie organised to meet with the principals of the Clare Primary, St Joseph's and Vineyard Lutheran School to ensure that our donation of the word dictionaries and essential facts and figures maths books were still appropriate. The feedback was very positive and as well as helping the students, we were informed that the parents also use them.

In Dec 2017, we put together a Rotary flag float, for the local Christmas pageant. We needed minimal man power for this, as all other members were required to do the most important job of crowd/traffic control. Thanks go to Graham Goode for his organisation for the crowd control. Thanks go to the Rotarians who helped put the float together, once I got my thoughts gathered as to how it was all going to work. To Rotarian Glen Waldhuter who offered us the use of his Ute and putting on the finishing touches, such as music, lights and glitz. Our Rotary exchange student Maya invited some of her friends to hand out balloons, pens and happy faces.

Our committee came together and a few suggestions were put forward to help some of our more deserving residents of Clare. It was decided to support the residents of Carinya Age Care Facility. After speaking to the Diversional and Occupational Therapists, the committee decided to purchase equipment that is used to help maintain the resident's mobility, agility, balance and strength, thus reducing the risk of falls. We purchased equipment from Peekaboo Kids and Sports Power, with both businesses being very generous with their donations. \$400 worth of equipment was presented to the residents and this is used 2 – 3 times a week.

To Margaret Kimber, thank you for collating the local contact directory. This is quite a job and Margaret continues to put this together. We had several working bees to get it organised to be distributed and with one last push, with extended family members we got over the finish line and all worked out well.

Another project was followed up by Bruce Reichstein, which involves the information plaques on the Riesling Trail, which Rotary initially supported. This project will need to be followed up next year as we are waiting for the Lions Club to contact us as to exactly what is required repair/replace. The other project is the lifter at the therapy pool at the complex. This has rusted out and has not been replaced. More investigation will need to be done, before any decisions are made.

Our last project has come through Australian Rotary Health, and we are hosting an evening at the Clare Bowling Club on the 28th of June, addressing issues related to mental health. We have 4 guest speakers on how to access help, helpful strategies to reduce anxiety/stress, help recognise and support other that need help and succession planning. Thanks to everyone who has helped this come together, especially Jim Scott, who completed the flyers, Ian Howlett who helped design the flyers. Also, to Rosemary and Graham Pulford who distributed the flyers with the scone drive, through the Art Show.

I thank the members of the committee Patricia Jacka, Bruce Reichstein, Ted Burford, and Rosemary Pulford for their support this year and the other Rotarians that enabled us to achieve our goals and have fun doing it.

RYDA Programme Report 2018

The Rotary Youth Driver Awareness programme was again run this year on June 5th & 6th at the Valley's Lifestyle Centre, our 10th year in a row.

It has evolved considerably from a very paper and blackboard-based curriculum to a very professionally developed computer-based program. Changing the name and format of some of the segments has created challenges along the way, however, the program is the very latest information and technology to make it relevant to the current years students.

We did experience some difficulties with dates and final numbers, along with equipment shortages, all of which were overcome to make it another successful program. We did drop the ball on a few things this year and we will be working with the new board to put things in place to overcome this in the future. We have also surveyed the current presenters to ensure that all necessary equipment is available for them to present their segment as effectively as they can.

The management of the Valley's Lifestyle Centre has changed and we had some concerns about the cost of the venue. However, after discussions with the new management they allowed us to use the venue at no charge as has been the case in the past. At the end of this year's program, they advised that same will apply for at least next year.

We had 161 students attend this year from Clare High, Balaklava High, Horizon Christian School and Burra Community School. Unfortunately, Riverton pulled out at very late notice but I have no doubt all who attended took something valuable from the experience.

We chose Maya Corbisier. a student from Belgium, as she listed her interest as swimming /sport which we thought would help her adjust and make it easier for her to start friendships with Australian students and kids who are interested in the same things.

Maya [sounds like meyer] arrived on the 23rd June was hosted by Ursula Pumpa and family. Maya settled in well and soon began to make friends at school. Maya participated with the goat handling at the Royal Adelaide Show. This was a real eye opener for her and the associated rural life.

In November Maya attended the Rotary Student exchange weekend at Calperum Conservation Reserve at Renmark here she experienced very hot weather and the very dry bush land. In December Maya invited some of her friends to participate with the Rotary Float in the Clare Christmas pageant.

We involved Maya in helping us choose her next host family. All was ready for the change but unfortunately this was not to be and as it was so close to Christmas the club made the decision that she could have an extended stay with Ursula until another family could be found. Ian Howlett and I had to do some quick thinking and a big THANK YOU to Gypsey Sandow who was able to

help fill the gap of a couple of weeks till Maya was able to go to her next Host family Anna and Tom Hawker.

In January Maya was lucky enough to experience time at Bondi Beach for 10 days following her passion of lifesaving, which she is involved with in Belgium. On her return she went to Anna & Tom and 4 children in the Hawker household. This was quite an adjustment for Maya as well as for Gypsey and the Hawkers, as Maya had spent approx. 5 months with her 1st host family. With Maya into swimming, and with support from Anna, she excelled at school swimming competitions and participated in competitions with Clare Swimming Club. Due to Maya's very shy nature it took a bit of coaxing for her to share this with our club.

March saw the 21 days around Australia trip for the exchange students. Ian and Kerry Howlett were lucky enough to travel with this group as chaperones. As yet we haven't heard any good stories from Ian or Maya. Perhaps when Maya gives her final speech there may be one or two.

We are most grateful for Lee Hooper being our 4th host family. Maya has settled in well from what she has told us and she certainly seems happy at school. Lee helps with our Art show through the high school and Maya was going to help with the catering but unfortunately was ill on that night.

The club again experienced great difficulty in finding host families either within the club or our community. Maya has also had limited time with our club and its members. She has had a great experience with making and breaking up with new friends at school and adjusting to different family structures and from this it has helped her to develop a positive attitude and to plan the next chapter in her life. - 2 years schooling in Sweden.

There have been several discussions of our club's recent involvement in the Rotary youth Exchange. Some of these were the results of incoming students inability to participate in the program to ensure they got the most out of their 12 months exchange. The club itself is continuing to experience difficulty in finding host families. The age of our members and low number of members all contribute to us needing more discussion on how to make this program work better for all parties

The next 12 months we are trialling sharing a student with the Rotary Club of Gawler. We will host the student for the 1st 6 months and then she will go to Gawler and attend a school there. Ursula Pumpa and Ian Howlett and Kerry Clift will be our 2nd host family. Gawler will have the counsellor and be responsible for the paper trail etc. The student is from Swedish girl and arrives July 15.

In Jan/Feb 2018 I was very lucky to assist Ian Howlett in chaperoning 37 out- bound Rotary Exchange Students from all over Australia to Heathrow airport England. It was a great experience especially try when we had 3 different terminals 12 different gates and countries we had to ensure our charges made their connections plus some bags were checked all the to the final destination and others were not. But with all of this all the kids arrived at their destinations safely and only one students went missing for 24hrs.

I would like to sincerely Thank Ian Howlett and especially Kerry as it was her place that I filled. To Rotary Club of Clare for having faith and giving me your support over the last 2 years as a counsellor, I must say at times it has really tested me and at times pushed me to my limits. I've made negatives into positives and certainly had a big learning curve but all in all I've enjoyed the ride. Thank you.
